



High quality programs with the greatest community impact

The South Burnaby Neighbourhood House has made a commitment to ensuring that we support our community by providing high quality programs. Our shared outcomes framework shapes our programs to promote the following community impacts: 1) Health and Wellbeing; 2) Inclusion, Belonging and Connectedness; 3) Leadership, Participation and Sense of Pride in Neighbourhood; 4) Community Safety; and 5) Responsive Public Policy. Our community impact is measured annually through the collection of statistics and program surveys.

Highlights of 2012-2013

Children, Youth and Families

- 250 children and their families were supported through our affordable quality childcare programs. This year we added 1 new childcare centre, bringing our total number to 8.
- 2 new licensed preschool programs at Clinton and Marlborough provided early learning opportunities for 55 children.
- Free "Friendship Clubs" at Maywood, Stride, Edmonds and Douglas Road - with funding from the United Way and the Royal Bank of Canada - provided opportunities for 190 children in grades 2-7 to be engaged in safe activities in the after school hours.
- Neighbourhood House "Family Place" programs supported 302 parents and their young children to create a sense of support and belonging.
- Our Early Years Outreach workers supported 432 isolated families to feel more connected.
- 135 youth were fully engaged in developing their leadership skills and volunteering with Neighbourhood House programs and out at community events.

Adult and Seniors

- The Community Adult Literacy Program worked with Douglas College to train and support 35 adult tutors who volunteered and helped 25 adult learners to learn to read and write.
- Over 2,500 income tax returns were filed helping individuals who live on limited income.
- The Seniors Together program welcomed 142 seniors and provided 960 healthy Friday lunches.
- The Seniors Outreach program supported 34 volunteer ambassadors who helped to reach out to 2,529 isolated seniors and connect them to local resources.
- The Community Volunteer program provided work experience for 392 adults - many of whom were new immigrants looking for Canadian work experience.

Community Engagement

- We led an Anti-racism mural project that engaged 105 community members in an experiential arts engagement process. The results of this process were positive attitudes about diversity as well as a colorful mural painted on Marlborough Neighbourhood Care Centre.
- The Neighbourhood Small Grants program involved residents on 3 neighbourhood resident committees who supported 77 projects that brought Burnaby neighbours together to create positive changes.
- We trained 20 adults to provide diversity workshops in the community.
- New Horizons project allowed us to research and address issues
 of racism in order to create a welcoming community where all
 seniors are respected and included. We initiated a training project that recruited 15 seniors to be diversity workshop facilitators.
- 6 sharing of culture dinners were hosted where 360 people met their neighbours and experienced a new culture. 6 Summer BBQ's were also hosted where 400 community members enjoyed a Canadian summer tradition.
- We welcomed 127 individuals who were new to our community and helped them get connected to local resources.
- Our staff and volunteers actively participated on local planning tables and supported numerous community festivals and events.
