Child Care Challenges in Burnaby

Quality child care is unaffordable for many Burnaby

families. It is common for parents to pay \$700 - \$1,200 per month, depending on the type of care and age of the child. Some parents are eligible for the Provincial Child Care Subsidy to assist with child care costs. "It is common for parents to pay \$700 -\$1,200 per month" **Quality child care programs provide** an important contribution to the social and economic development of the community. Quality child care supports parents and promotes early childhood development and later school success. In October 2012. there were 4.110 full-time licensed spaces in Burnaby or about 15 licensed spaces for every 100 children. Many group child care programs are full. Obtaining a space in a licensed group Infant/Toddler program, or finding School-Aged child care that serves a particular school, can be especially challenging.

Recruiting and retaining staff remains an ongoing challenge for many group child care centres. Despite post-secondary education requirements to become an Early Childhood Educator, there is a lack of status associated with the work and wages are low.

Finding a location to open a group child care centre is challenging.

This is due to the high cost of land and/or buildings. Issues such as zoning and parking also have to be considered, as well as making sure the site has enough indoor and outdoor play space.
